THE BEGGS DRAIN.

The Brenner drain agitation has "started the ball rolling," so to speak, and it now appears that an extensive system of drainage is to be built which will cover a large territory in the northern part of Mornington and Wellesley and the south of Peel and Maryboro. The branch of this system which passes through North Wollesley (known as the Alex. Beggs drain) is very long extending through parts of four townships, the cost in each township being: "Mornington, \$2four townships, the cost in each township being: "Mornington, \$2-979; Wellesley, \$1,328; Peel, \$487; Maryboro, \$1,388. To this will be added \$116.55 charged to the municipality where the drain crosses roads etc. The total cost of the drain is \$6,640.40. Para ers whose lands naturally drain into this litch are to be assessed for the cost So far it is thought the farmer will not oppose the building of the ditch as they are considered legal ly responsible to pay for the out let for the surface water which naturally flows from their lands. But the farmers who are building the Bronner drain are also assessed \$290 towards building the Beggs drain, and it is expected they will appeal because the building of this in is not yet finally decided upon and the sum charged against them should not be fixed until they are sure of getting the Brenner drain ompleted. Parties interceled in this latter drain are to meet the engineer, lawyer and Reeve Robert-son in a few days to decide whether to anneal or not. Their decision will likely be given in the work's Magic today.


