## THE BEGG'S DRAIN.

The Brenner drain agitation has "started the ball rolling," so to speak, and it now appears that an extensive system of drainage is to be built which will cover a large territory in the northern part of Mornington and Wellesley and the south of Peel and Maryboro.

The branch of this system which passes through North Wellesley (known as the Alex. Beggs drain) is very long extending through parts of four townships, the cost in each township being: "Mornington, \$3,970; Wellesley, \$1,332; Peel, \$687; Maryboro, \$1,383. To this will be added \$118.55 charged to the municipality where the drain crosses roads etc.

The total cost of the drain is \$6,640.40. Farmers whose lands naturally drain into this ditch are to be assessed for the cost. So far it is thought the farmers will not oppose the building of the ditch as they are considered legally responsible to pay for the outlet for the surface water which naturally flows from their lands.

But the farmers who are building the Brenner drain are also assessed \$490 towards building the Beggs drain, and it is expected they will appeal because the building of this drain is not yet finally decided upon and the sum charged against them should not be fixed until they are sure of getting the Brenner drain completed.

Parties interested in this latter drain are to meet the engineer, lawyer and Reeve Robertson in a few days to decide whether to appeal or not. Their decision will likely be given in the week's Maple Leaf.

### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Hon. G. W. Ross, ex-Premier of the Province of Ontario, and the present leader of the Opposition, is to be made a member of the Senate of the Dominion of Canada.

With Mr. Ross in the Senate the Ontario Reform Party will need to hustle around for a leader. Not that timbre is scarce, for in that case—if there were only one or two capable for the office—the task would be an easy one. But it happens that small as the opposition is in the House just now it is not lacking in men of ability who would like the job. Mr. T. H. Priston, M. L. A., for Brant, has frequently been mentioned as Mr. Ross' successor in recent times. The office is a specially desirable one for it carries with it the possibility of Prefecture when the barnacles have finally been scraped off the Reform ship which is now in dry-dock.

The Sultan of Turkey used to be called "The Sick Man of the East," and many all over the world who read of the horrors in his kingdom, hoped he would speedily die. Now he has a neighbor—the Czar of Russia—stricken down with the same sickness, and when the two cases are compared the Sultan's case seems only a slight attack. The disease is easily diagnosed. It is the direct result of long standing Despotism, and Ignorance. Jealousy in Turkey and Russia, gradually learning that the masses in civilized countries got better treatment, has become dissatisfied, and its awful efforts to throw off Despotism has resulted in—two very sick men. But the remedy is much more difficult. The home treatment is only aggravating the two cases; its atrocities are horrifying the Christian world. It is a clear case where help from civilization is needed. But the civilized world is not prepared to step in, for civilization worships two gods—Christ and Money—and we are not sure that we have put the most prominent one first. Christianity says "let us go over to Macedonia and help them," but Money says "it pays us more to let them suffer and die in their misery." Ten years of Anglo-Saxon methods of government would bring both the Czar and Sultan out of their sick beds and start the two down-trodden peoples on the way to happiness. And this remedy would, without doubt, be speedily applied were it not for the influence of the god Money, through his powerful agents Jealousy and Grasp. Meantime Turkey and Russia are suffering the agonies of the damned while Christianity looks on horrified and—imbecile.

At the council meeting last Monday there was a large attendance of ratepayers interested in the "Boggy drain," a drain projected to properly carry away the surface water of a large tract extending northward in the northwestern part of Wellesley and into Peel. The matter was "sprung" on the council at their July meeting, and in order to temporarily protect the farmers assessed for this drain, they appealed, and invited the farmers to come to the August meeting which they did on Monday. Here the matter was fully explained, showing that all

the assessments made were for injuring liability—that is, a legal responsibility to assist in paying for an outlet for water which flows into lower lands. After a full discussion the feeling was to drop the appeal, and each farmer interested was given the amount of his individual assessment so that he can personally appeal at the proper time if he considers himself over-taxed. This "Boggy" drain is one arm of a series of drains extending from Mornington to Peel, Wellesley and Maryboro, and to enlarge the drain near its outlet to properly carry away all those waters below the "Brenner" drain outlet.

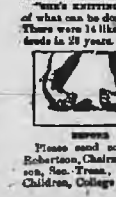

The cost is 60 cents per patient per day, and there were 129 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.
