The bonnsing of wire fences i becoming a sore trial to municipal councils. While it is true that wire fencing has wonderfully belied the winter roads, yet long stretches have been built—not because they were needed to better the roads not because the council ordered it has been because they council ordered it. -but because new fences were needed in the interests of the fa.m. neceded in the interests of the faint, and because wire fences have occome the cheapest fence a farmer can put up. And yet a look at the council min utes almost any month shows a long pay roll for wire fencing bonus, much of which the council knew little or nothing about until the fence was finished and application fence was finished and application for the bonns money was made One can scarcely blame the fence builders for asking this bonus money, because it comes out of the taxes which all have to pay and one man has as much right to take the bonus as another if his con-science will let him do it. The council stands in a serious position with regard to the public highways it must keep them in the best possible condition and yet handle the township's money in the most care ful and economical manner in keepfig the roads up. We believe the wire fence bonus offer has outlived its usefulness in Wellesley town-ship and that its place should be taken by a by-law compelling the removal of all fences which obremoval or all fences which ob-struct the roads by causing snow drifts, pitch-holes and other winter road abominations. The by-law should empower the Board to pay an equitable share of the cost of properly replacing the obstructing finces, as that no invalidation had fences, so that no injustice be done, but the rigid enforcement of such a by-law would enable the council to spend the people's money on the people's roads in a manner that would do the people the most pos-


