He first fries his vegetables separately in oil until they are a little more than half cooked. He then sets them aside and fries in oil, also cloves, cordamon seeds, bay leaf, finely chopped chill pebpers, etc. Then he disolves the curry powder in salted water, after which he mixes the ingredients together adding the curry last, The entire mixture is then placed in a tightly covered pan to cook gently over a six wfire until all of the vegetables become tender.
