#### A Dish For To-Day.

Vegetarian and those who are abstaining from the eating of meat on account of the stock yard revelations, will find in the September Delicacies a recipe for vegetable curry given by Frank Abbesian, and leader of the New York Vedanta Society. He first fries his vegetables separately in oil until they are a little more than half cooked. He then sets them aside and fries in oil, also cloves, cardamom seeds, bay leaf, finely chopped chili peppers, etc. Then he dissolves the curry powder in salted water, after which he mixes the ingredients together adding the curry last. The entire mixture is then placed in a tightly covered pan to cook gently over a slow fire until all of the vegetables become tender.
