### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Three or four bye-elections are now on. Some are for Dominion parliament and some for the Ontario legislature. The majority in both Houses is so strong that the results of these bye-elections have only a local interest.

Business has grown so rapidly on the Galt-Berlin electric railway that the question of increasing their power is becoming a necessity. Only a year or two ago an immense power plant was installed at Preston and a storage battery at Berlin which was supposed to be sufficient for many years to come. As the Company are hoping to use Niagara power in a year or two they are naturally not anxious to go to the expense of increasing their power at present, and consequently the Wellesley extension is not considered as an immediate scheme although the road is now completed through Waterloo town. Meantime the need for railway connection is as great as ever in the Wellesley section. They freely offered to tax themselves to the limit in the bonus by-law a couple of years ago when the Preston-Berlin Company was balked from building by Berlin's tardiness. With the power now so scarce it would require a much larger bonus to induce the present building of an extension to have to be raised in Berlin, and it is not apparent that the county town is anxious just now in the matter. Wellesley section will therefore require to turn in some other direction if it hopes for relief in the near future.

Several people in Berlin are wondering why the speed limit of an automobile in the county town is fixed at ten miles an hour while a horse may only go six according to law. It is the old argument of fish and flesh.

That "Michigan air-ship" is still to be seen in the western skies every evening and is growing brighter. In a couple of months it will have passed to the morning skies and some one will then discover it as an air-ship somewhere in the neighborhood of Montreal. Venus is a pretty object just now, and in a few weeks sharp eyes will be able to pick out that little elusive red planet, Mercury, low down in the western sky.

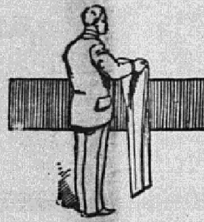
