EDITORIAL NOTES.

The old animosity between the North and the South which caused the civil war, has, no doubt, died out in the United States, but the old Party spirit which prevailed in those days still remains. The recent State elections show that the "solid South" is as Democratic as it ever was.

What is that element in politics which makes a man vote blindly with one particular political Party all his life, and actually boast of it? There are thousands of such electors in Ontario, notwithstanding that this Province is considered one of the most highly educated in the world. That man who studies the political problem and then votes fearlessly on either side according to his judgment is looked upon with distrust by both parties. He is pushed to the background. He gets no public office. He is chairman of no committee or public meeting. He is never chosen as candidate for parliament. Let a man show independence of spirit and courage, and the "Party" will soon find a way to turn him down and out. In the interests of good wholesome, pure, wise government this is not as it should be. If our elections were conducted upon the patriotic slogan "What's best for Canada is good enough for me," there would soon be a horde of one

men anxious to get an electric street railway installed on a profitable basis. The Classic City is large enough to need a service of this kind, but is not populous enough to properly support it. If Stratford would join with Berlin and Waterloo in the effort to get the Berlin-Preston electric road extended westward, their success would mean the building of this fine road as far as Stratford (a distance of only about 24 miles) and very probably on south to the main line of the C. P. R. near Ingersoll. By carrying the passengers of this road over the main streets of Stratford their street railway problem would be happily solved, while this road would bring to their doors the riches of West Zorra and North Easthope. The freight traffic could pass Stratford by a loop line, as is done on this same road in Waterloo, Berlin, Preston and Galt. By the time such a road could be completed the Preston-Berlin road will be operated by Niagara power, thus guaranteeing an ample motive force for its entire length. It will not be difficult to show the C. P. R. magnates that this line would be very profitable from end to end and that a short spur line somewhere between Waterloo and Stratford joining, say at Hawkesville, with the Guelph-Goderich branch, would give that road the desired connection with Stratford. After the C.P.R. becomes interested all that is required is that the municipalities interested act sensibly generous in the matter of bonus inducement.

A street-car strike is on in Hamilton. The strikers so far have the sympathy of the city. On Monday the Company made an effort to start the cars running, but there were no passengers, and a shower of high priced—and highly flavored—eggs sent the cars quickly back to the barns for the day.
