EDITORIAL NOTES.

If we are not mistaken one of the planks in the platform of the conservative party now in power is to allow the counties to choose the county officials instead of having them appointed by the party government which happens to be in power in Toronto. The rate payers who are considered intelligent enough to elect the county council ought to be able to judge as to who would make a capable registrar, sheriff, etc. If, however, they were so foolish as to vote for these officials from a "party" standpoint, the case would be no worse than at present, because under party appointments service to the Party and not the public are the prior qualities for securing these offices. Indeed the elective plan would be better for it would provide a way of changing the officials by ballot when the next election was held, instead of waiting for death to remove them. The system of dangling these offices before party workers as emoluments is not conducive of pure government, and since Mr. Whitney has declared for the purity of politics we confidently look for the early removal of this very large "harnace" from the "ship of State."

Notwithstanding the Toronto

Gloucester and the

very unjust, the Whitney government has made a fine record so far in undoing the wrongs of its predecessor and in giving honest service. But it is being closely watched by an intelligent electorate who at the last election laid their hand heavily upon what they considered wrong doing, and will not hesitate to repeat the dose if it becomes necessary. If Ontario is to maintain its high Christian reputation it must draw an emphatic line between partyism and purity until the scandalousness of the recent past becomes impossible to repeat.

The Galt Daily Reporter, in commenting on an article republished from last week's Maple Leaf, says the more the extension northward of the Galt Berlin electric railway is considered the wider the possibility of the scheme becomes. This is true. The joining of the large towns of Waterloo, Perth and Oxford counties by a strong radial electric line would open a new era of wealth, convenience and prosperity to the people along its line, and become a veritable Cobalt for the shareholders of the road.

Linwood is no longer the "Embryo Railway Center," as the Maple Leaf christened it a couple of years ago. It is now the full-fledged center and has regular trains every day. Mr. R. Y. Fish and his coterie of workers can congratulate themselves that their efforts helped largely to turn the line of this road from the first survey near Macton to Linwood, and afterwards secure a branch to Listowel.

Dominion parliament meets at Ottawa next week. This date is unusually early, but it is a wise move since the talking habit has become a disease in parliament. The electors seem satisfied to pay for these long sessions but draw the line at having to read those long speeches during the dog days.

AN EDITOR'S JOYOUS LIFE.

"Every once in a while," says an exchange, "some cheerful individual remarks to us 'well, now that the paper is out I suppose you can take it easy for three or four days.' Yes how delightful it is that a country editor has practically nothing to do between press days. Business runs along automatically. When paper bills come due money drops off the trees with to pay them. Subscribers vie with each other to see who can pay the farthest in advance. Advertisers beg for additional space. And the way the news hunts up the editor is also pleasant to contemplate. There is something really strange about the way news items act. When the paper is out the editor simply goes to his desk leans back in his easy chair and looks wise and waits for next week's press day. The day before press day the people line up in front of the office door and then they file past the desk and tell him all the news of the week. He writes it up in fifteen or twenty minutes, takes it back and hangs it on the hook. The compositor takes the copy, shakes it over the type cases, says a few magic words and the type flies into place, and after a few passes by the foreman the forms are ready for the press again. And then the editor goes back to his desk and waits for the next week's press day. It is the greatest snap in the catalogue. Now, if the editor could only do away with press day, his joy would be complete."
