The Pittsburgh "Leader" in referring to his speech said: "He gave a splendid tribute to the Pittsburgh orchestra. He spoke of the esteem in which the orchestra was held in Canada, especially in Toronto where for several years the annual season of concerts in connection with the Mendelssohn Choir of that city was admitted to be the most important musical event of the year in Canada. #### THE REFEREE'S DECISION.

A few weeks ago the Maple Leaf published the only correct report of the decision of Referee Rankin re the Brenner drain appeal. Since that time one or more neighboring papers have published a so-called report of the Referee's decision which is misleading and incorrect. As the township is deeply interested in this matter, we herewith give the text of the Referee's decision, as given over his own signature:

"The plaintiff (Mr. Stever) was justified in making this application in respect of the proposed by-law upon certain of the grounds of objections set forth by him, but that sufficient irregularity has not been shown to invalidate said by-law. It is ordered and adjudged that by-law No. 679 is legal and binding and that this application is hereby dismissed. And it is further ordered and adjudged that the defendant (Wellesley township) shall forthwith after taxation there of pay to the plaintiff his costs of and incidental to this application as between solicitor and client, to be taxed by the local Registrar of the High Court of Justice at Berlin on the High Court scale, as if he had been wholly successful upon all the issues involved, and that the defendants' costs shall be taxed by the said local Registrar upon the same scale, and the entire amount of the taxed costs of both parties shall be assessed against the lands and roads in the township of Wellesley assessed under said by-law for benefit, or onerous liability and incurring liability pro rata in accordance with the amount so assessed against said lands and roads respectively.
