Mr. Gustave Woiwade, in this illuge, has what appears to be one of the very oldest copies of the bible, possibly on the continent of of the very oldest copies of the bible, possibly on the continent of America. In three different places it is stated that the book was printed in the year MDXLVI (A.D. 1569), and the cumbersome volume with its ancient form of type and faded paper tends to bear out the assertion. It is printed in German duractors and is difficult to read to the modern German scholars. On the fly-less is written a statement which indicates that the book was a family beir-loom in tiermany and was brought to "Upper Canada" in was brought to "opper canada" in 1848, by the Mr. Wagner who lo-cated in that year on the farm in Baden new occupied by the Living-stone mansion. The bible belongs to the Wagner family, Berlet's Corners, whose ancestors have evi-dently owned it for a contary or more The book was evidently re-bound, but even this work appears to have been done over 100 years ago.
