### THE HOME PAPER

The home paper is perhaps not so large as some of its city competitors, but it gives the local news that you can get no where else. The "bigger paper for less money" doesn't print the news around your home; your births, deaths, and marriages; your visitors; your municipal news; your auction sales, etc. The home paper gives all this; it is the first paper opened by the family; it contains the news that is liable to make money for the farmer who takes it. Because it is run on a smaller scale, and with a much smaller circulation than the big city weeklies, it costs more to get it out every week and the price is more to those who are looking for the most paper for the money. But subscribing for the home paper is like buying a pair of boots—you can buy a pair of his number eleven (with a good deal more leather in them) at the same price as sevens. The principle which prompts a man to stop his home paper because it is not as big as some paper printed in some other town is the principle which should induce a man to take the latest boots for the money. The local paper which cannot work up a paying list of subscriptions at \$1.00 a year is justified in transporting itself to some other place where the people appreciate the work done in a community by a live local paper.

### AN OLD BIBLE.

Mr. Gustave Wolwade, in this village, has what appears to be one of the very oldest copies of the bible, possibly on the continent of America. In three different places it is stated that the book was printed in the year MDXVI (A. D. 1566), and the cumbersome column with its ancient form of type and faded paper tends to bear out the assertion. It is printed in German characters and is difficult to read to the modern German scholars. On the fly-leaf is written a statement which indicates that the book was a family heir-loom in Germany and was brought to "Upper Canada" in 1848, by the Mr. Wagner who located in that year on the farm in Baden now occupied by the Livingstone mansion. The bible belongs to the Wagner family, Berles Corners, whose ancestors have evidently owned it for a century or more. The book was evidently rebound, but even this work appears

to have been done over 100 years ago. Those wishing to see this relic of ancient days can do so by calling at Mr. Wolwade's tailor shop.
