"I must praise our butchers on their care in shaughtering discussed arisingly appropriate to the property of the prope

animals, whenever the animal shows any signs of disease in having an inspection made by the vet-erinary inspector, about twenty such inspections being made during the year and more that number of animals destroyed, which shows the absolute necessity of great care in the selection of our food supply. I would recommend an inspection of milk cows, as undoubtedly milk of diseased cows is being used at present especially is such the ca in regard to tuberculosis.

Our impector made an inspection of slaughter houses and factories and found them in good condition.

I would again urge all householders to at once notify the proper authorities of any suspected con-tugious or infectious discusses thereby reducing to a minimum the danger of the spreading of such diseases. D. Moeachren, M. H. O.
