ONTARIO PUBLIC LIBRARIES.

The Educational Department has just issued a beautifully printed report of the various Ontario Public and Free Libraries, including pictures and plans of the Carnegie libraries in the Province.

Mr. T. W. H. Leavitt Public Labrary Inspector, editor of the re-port, has the following interesting serning the scheme travelling libraries. which is being rapidly mashed by the partment this year.

Ore of the greatest obstacles hindering the growth of Public Libraries in small communities is the difficulty experienced in scouring sufficient fund for the purchase of new books. The government grant, being based upon the amount expended annually for books, necessarily small, consequently demands are commantly made for a larger grant. A very large increase would be necessary to effect any substantial improvement among the small libraries. A systematic and centinged effort should be made to give access to collections of good books by farmers and the residents of small rillages. To accomplish such a desirable result, I recommend the development of an increase in the number Travelling Libraries. Rerote Reretofore

the Travelling Libraries of the Province have proptically been con-fined to the lumber camps of New oned to the luntar camps of New Outario. The camps are only operated on an average of six months in the year, consequently during the balance of the time the books are idle. Unless Canada would renew the old arrangements, the new one would have to go into effect at once. And into effect it comes. Perhaps some concession can be made to publish ers in view of the loss imposed on them luring the balance of the year by this trenty.
