WELLESLEY COUNCIL.

The municipal council of the township of Wellesley met, pursuant to adjournment, on Monday, 6th day of May, 10 o'clock a. m., at the council chamber, Crosshill.

All members were present, the reeve in the chair.

The minutes of last session were read and adopted.

Communications, bills and accounts were received.

Sworn evidence was given by Messrs John P. Heimpel and Alex. Meyer and their witnesses re the killing of sheep by a dog or dogs, after which

It was moved by H. N. Huehn, sec. by W. Hastings, that the sum of \$5.00 be paid to John P. Heimpel as compensation for one sheep killed by a dog or dogs, and that the reeve issue an order for the same. Carried.

In like manner it was moved by J. Reidel, sec. by H. N. Huehn, that the sum of \$10 be paid to A. Meyer for 1 sheep killed by a dog or dogs, and that the reeve issue an order for the said amount. Carried.

Council adjourned at 12 15 p. m. Reassembled at 1 p. m.

SEWERAGE BY-LAW.

The final passing of the A. Beggs' drainage by-law was at once taken up.

Council went into committee of the whole on by-law No 501 re drainage work.

On motion of Robertson and Huehn, J. Biddell was made chairman of said committee. After filling in the blanks, said by-law it was moved by W. Hastings sec. by H. N. Huehn, that committee reassemble in open council. Carried.

Committee in open council. Whereupon it was moved by A. B. Robertson, sec. by H. N. Huehn, that by-law No. 501 be read a third time and passed. Carried.

Moved by J. Reidel, sec. by H. N. Huehn, that the rate payers of the police village of Hawkesville, be exempted from doing statute labor on the several boundary lines. Carried.

Moved by J. Reidel, seconded by H. N. Huehn, that the following accounts be paid and that the reeve issue orders in payment of the same as follows, viz:

Moved by R. Lintick, seconded by W. Hastings, that the clerk is hereby instructed to advertise for tenders for the abutments and superstructure to the Deatling bridge. Tenders will be received at the township hall, Crosshill, up to 2 o'clock, p. m., on Monday the 3rd day of June, 1907. The lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted. Contractors to furnish their own plans and specifications. Carried.

Moved by H. N. Huehn, seconded by W. Hastings, that by-law No. 501 be read a third time and passed.

Carried.

Finally moved by J. Reidel sec. by W. Hastings, that this council do now adjourn to meet again at township hall, Crosshill, the first Monday in June, 1907, 10 o'clock a. m. The court of Revision re the assessment rolls will be held the same day at 1:30 p. m.

The Board intend to take vigorous measures with a view of maintaining first class sanitary conditions. All premises are to be closely inspected and nuisances abated, and a request is being made to the council to purchase a proper tent to be used as an emergency hospital.

THE PERFECT SHORTCAKE.

To enjoy the unique pleasure of eating a genuine old-fashioned American shortcake, one must not turn to the foreign chef, for he will not know how to satisfy that craving. The wise epicure will search out some good American cook and she will prove to him that there are gastronomic delights unknown to the best master of any foreign cuisine. The chances are that this will be the recipe that she will use:

"To two cups of flour add a teaspoonful and a half of baking powder, half a tablespoonful of pure lard or melted butter and enough sweet milk to make the dough." Or, if she has become used to the more modern methods of cooking, she may amplify the matter by merely adding a tablespoonful of the melted butter to two cups of prepared flour, and moistening it with the sweet milk.

In either case she will bake the "cake" until the crust has attained just the proper degree of crispness, after which she will split it through the center, with a sharp knife, and lay it with the top of butter, and when the fruit has been piled high upon them, and has been plentifully covered with powdered sugar, she will serve them, one on top of the other, accompanied by the traditional pitcher brimming full of thick yellow cream. —Milo Bradford in the May Edinboro.

INDEPENDENT.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The prompt filling of the office of Sheriff of the county of Perth, made vacant by the recent death of the lamented Mr. Hossie, was an act highly commended by everybody. Not only is Mr. Magwood, the new Sheriff, a competent and satisfactory appointee, but the government did a very popular act by settling the matter at once before a swarm of applicants created a local disturbance displeasing to everybody and disrupting to the party.

In Waterloo county there are one or two government vacancies which should be filled without delay if the Whitney government desires to avoid being charged with keeping them open for impure purposes. The office vacated by the death of Mr. McDougall several months ago should have been filled before now, and the choice of a successor should cause very little, if any, party friction. Outside of a few aspirants there are very few either in North or South Waterloo who would not be pleased to see the appointment go to Mr. Ferdinand Walter, the present license inspector for North Waterloo. Mr. Walter is the oldest and best-tried conservative in the county and has pulled the party out of many a difficult predicament in times past. His accepting of the office of License Inspector was not of his own choice, but to once more tide his party, to which he was loyal and faithful, over a very trying time. The duties of his present office are very laborious to a gentleman of his age, and it is no more than fitting that this valiant war-horse should spend his declining years in an office with more of the emolument and less of the strenuousness of political reward. The two local members, Dr. Lackner and Mr. Pattinson, have a delicate duty to perform in this matter, but they will gain more by exhibiting a little "backbone" than by trying to please everybody.

Will Mr. J. P. Jaffray, reeve of Galt, rise in his place at the mid-summer meeting of the Waterloo county council and move the following resolution? If so we can safely promise him that at least nine reeves or their deputies will second it:

"Resolved, that this council respectfully petition Premier Whitney to amend the law respecting the million dollar bonus for permanent roads so that the government's cash bonus will be available to towns, villages, townships or county councils in constructing their permanent bridges, approaches, culverts and roads."

The Provincial surplus is growing by leaps and bounds and a better investment for some of it could not be made than to assist individual municipalities in building these public structures which in reality belong to the Province, for use, and which are becoming too costly to load entirely upon the municipality in which they are situated.

Mr. T. W. Crothers, of St. Thomas, declined to accept a \$2,000 cheque sent him by the Provincial Government for his services as chairman of the School Book Commission. And he was a lawyer! How a lawyer could be induced to lope his fist after it got around a big wad is a question which is rapidly sending the old-time politicians batty.

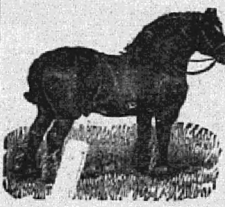
