NORTH EASTHOPE.

The death occurred last week of Mrs. Margaret McDermid, at the residence of her son, Duncan McDermid, lot 32, con. 7 North Easthope, aged 53 years. Deceased was a native of Scotland and had resided in North Easthope for the past sixty-six years. Her husband pre-deceased her about sixteen years ago. The late Mrs. McDermid had a large circle of friends who will sincerely regret to learn of her death. She is survived by four sons and two daughters. They are:— Thomas Missouri; John, St. Thomas, N. D.; Duncan, North-Easthope, Malcom; Mrs. Nichol, and Mrs. Bateman of Stratford.

One of the oldest pioneers of North Easthope passed away on Thursday in the person of Mr. Patrick Brennan, aged 85 years. Deceased has been ill with Bright's disease for the past two years, and his death was not unexpected. For sixty-four years the late Mr. Brennan resided on lot 42, con. 1, North Easthope and was widely known and respected by all of his acquaintances. Deceased came to North Easthope in 1843 with his mother, three brothers and one sister, from County Monaghan, Ireland, settling on the lot where he has always resided since that time. He was a Catholic, a member of St. Joseph's parish, a supporter of the Liberal party. The late Mr. Brennan is survived by his wife and one sister, Mrs. William Scott, of Sacramento, California.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Sweet Bay is the beth of our dreams. Add of love, add of flowers, add ice creams; But with coads id our heads We'll sneezing in bed. For we flout out Bay's dot what it seeds.

The premier of New Foundland took occasion to give the British government his flat opinion of the way they are treating the island in the fisheries question with the United States. He even went so far as to tanat the home government with taking advantage of a colony because they thought it too weak to strike back. It was at a meeting of the Premiers in England and he had the satisfaction of knowing that almost every one of them sympathized with him.

The slowness of the railway companies in dealing with the question of building a railway to the Wellesley section has its cause in the present great building activities of both the C. P. R. and G. T. R. The need of having this road, however, is becoming greater than ever and it might be well to build it by private enterprise. A line either to Baden or Waterloo would be remarkably free from engineering difficulties or grades and cuts, so that the cost per mile need scarcely be more than building a prairie section. With the bonuses which the section interested seems willing to give and the possibilities of bonding the roadbed it should not be difficult to dispose of the stock necessary to fully capitalize it. Indeed the stock issued could be made very attractive, especially as it is already assured that the road will be a very profitable one. There is a good opening here for some enterprising promoter.

The fire protection committee of the Wellesley Board of Trade is carefully working out the problem and will soon be ready to report. The special committee appointed to secure information has also about completed its work, so there will be some important discussions at the general meeting shortly to be held.

The Galt Daily Reporter of last Friday, in reference to an article on the permanent roads question in last week's Maple Leaf, says:

"Reeve Jaffray can scarcely be expected to do all that when a Road and Bridge Committee is empowered to make the necessary moves for the good of the county as a whole. But before he will let the matter drop, as is now proposed by the committee referred to, the gentleman in question will move a resolution having for its object Government assistance to villages and towns that build standard roadways and submit them to Government inspection. If the townships are not prepared to reform their methods they can scarcely refuse to give urban municipalities an opportunity to earn the Provincial bonus in macadamizing stretches of leading roads from corporation limits, say for one-half mile each. Pressure from the towns and incorporated villages, exercised in a friendly spirit, will probably solve the County Road problem. At least it will be worth trying."

The reporter but thinly disguises its disgust at the tame way the Road and Bridge committee of the County council fled from their scheme after going to the expense and trouble they did. And a Berlin daily hints that the committee

drew back because of suburban opposition, "principally from the Wellesley section" (meaning, of course, the Maple Leaf.) Well, Mr. Jaffray is courageous and a man of modern convictions and we look for him to bring this very important matter up at the next session of the county council, hoping that his generosity will prompt him to include the townships in his resolution. Better roads, and a better system of road building are badly needed in Ontario, and we believe the government's assistance should be extended to every municipality, no matter how small, in making roads, bridges and culverts which are permanent and modern.

Work has been commenced on the railway connecting St Marys with the C. P. R. main line at Ingersoll. The line runs southward through West Zorra.

Toronto league base ball club has a player named Wotell. That's what he says to the umpire when he is called out on strikes.

Judge E. P. Clement, who was lately appointed to the bench in Essex county, is to retire in September and return to Berlin and accept the vice-presidency of the Waterloo Insurance Company. Mr. Clement has gained a high standing as a lawyer in Waterloo county and a wide personal popularity. This latest move which brings him back to the county will be welcomed by all.

Perth county council is meeting with the same opposition in trying to take up the government's bonus for long stretches of "leading" "county" roads which nearly every county council had to face in dealing with this matter. Farmers are willing to pay their share for permanent roads to the nearest market, but not for long stretches which are only of use to automobilists.

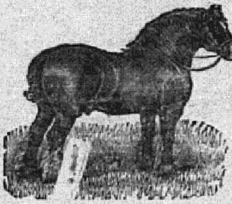

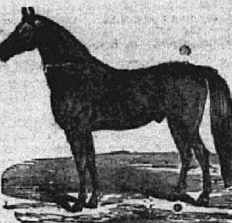

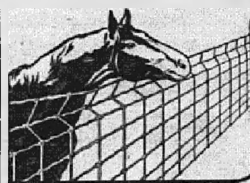
