EDITORIAL NOTES.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson, ex-Minister of Railways is busy. This is his wash day.

Loyalty to "Party" is responsible for much of the "dirty linen" that the Opposition is trying to hang on the Ministerial clotheslines. The spectacle is not one to raise Canada in the opinion of the world as a Dominion of pure government. The charges of graft are so numerous and persistent, and so boldly made, that it is difficult to believe that they contain nothing but an effort to injure the government. There should be a special, impartial tribunal, searching, powerful and swift in its scope, where the guilty, whether they be the accused or the accusers, could be adequately punished. These long drawn-out in which it is getting to be safe to accuse the trial judges of partisanship, and the longest purse wins, are of little or no use in purifying the political atmosphere. Responsible government necessarily involves partisanship; but when the electors permit their fealty to their particular party to sway their honest judgment as to what is best for Canada, there are always heads of politicians ready to take advantage of this false and foolish loyalty. And while they steal the Dominion's money they laugh at the fools who elected their party to power for no other reason than that they happened to be born grifts or Tories. Isn't it about time that the vaunted educational system of Canada developed the electors who have the loyalty and courage to vote their own convictions rather than blindly vote for party, taking their arguments from the over-paid political newspapers.

We do not believe the formation of an Independent Party would tend to remedy the evil, for the heeler has the knack of preventing the best intentions of any mass of voters. But the voter should keep independent so that no polling place could be counted on for a given boss-ridden majority in election after election as is the case at present. A good wholesome fear of the individual elector is the best weapon Canada has to keep the government and the politician honest. When turn-coats become respected by their neighbors, and dyed-in-the-wool "partyists" become recognized at their true mediocrity, we are on the right road to compel an honest government in the best interests of the Dominion, instead of being entirely in the interest of themselves at the expense of the people.

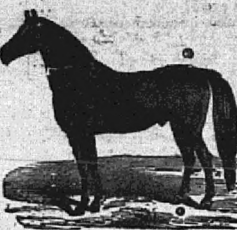

THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN

For it Cares for Every Sick Child in Ontario whose Parents Cannot Afford to Pay For Treatment.

The Hospital for Sick Children, College street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it nurses within its walls every year.

The Hospital is not a local institution—but Provincial. The sick child from any place in Ontario who can't afford to pay has the same privileges as the child living in Toronto and is treated free. The Hospital had last year in its beds and cots 761 patients. 267 of these were from 196 places outside of Toronto. The cost is 98 cents per patient per day, and there were 129 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.

Since its foundation the Hospital has treated 10,871 children—a total of 7,500 of these were unable to pay and were treated free. Every dollar may be the transmitter of your kind thoughts into the Hospital kind deeds.

place, lot 29, con 4, about 15 rods. He was given 12½ cts per rods to do the work. James A. Crerar, John F. Quinlan and Conrad Luckhart asked for grants for roads: all deferred until next meeting. John W. Bell asked for grant to help build cement sidewalk in Shakespear: Allowed \$20. John M. McCallum asked leave to cut brush along con 2 and 3 opposite lot 24: Granted.

The Revere and Mr. Korbes were appointed a committee to inspect the following bridges, as they have been reported out of repair, viz: Con. 4 and 5, opposite lot 37; con. 8 and 9 opposite lot 40; side line 30 con. 10; with power to act.

Con. Luckhart asked to have drain cleaned out on con. 13 opposite lot 25 and 26, deferred until later on. S. L. Yutala complained that North road was becoming filled in with brush, etc.: a letter from the Canada Company re the same matter was read. Deferred until later on. Mr. Yutala asked that culvert on blind line approach to northern gravel road be changed: Council agreed to attend to it later on. Tenders for working the road grader and stone crusher were then called for: road grader, James Quinlan with engine and everything complete at \$14.00 per day. Council deemed this too expensive and decided to allow the pathmasters run the grader this year. For the stone crusher, Henry E. Wettlaufer, 90c. per hour. W. J. McTavish, 85c. per hour. Jas. Peterson, \$1.00 per hour. The job was given to Wettlaufer. McTavish wanted 10 hours and 6 days a week, Wettlaufer was willing to take it as it comes. The clerk was directed to get out posters to the west of the Moffat and Nithburg bridges, on June the 5th at Nithburg. Cook and Hoffmeister Committee. The Revere reported that the rovee of Ellice had agreed to attend the fixing of culvert on N. G. road south of Gad's Hill; a few accounts were paid when the council adjourned.

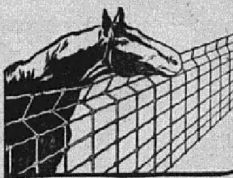
