An offer was made the other day for Mr. Davil Gascho's farm by which he would have made \$875. clear profit, but I believe by next spring he can get \$7000 for it, cr \$2000 more than he paid. David certainly made a good deal when he bought this farm. Twelve farms have been sold since Easter so you can see hew fast these snaps are being picked up. There are quite a number of cheap tarms, yet to be had, but people intending to buy would do well to come and see them at once, as every day counts in buying. We expect some in buying. If you would like to tell the Maple Leaf readers about the prices of these farms I will quote you a few: 100-acre farms from \$26 \$3600; 150-acre farms from \$3700 to \$5000 ; 200-acre farms from \$4000 to \$7000. Of course these prices only hold good for a couple of months. Farms can be bought without paying a dollar down; just by making a binding agrees ent. then taking possession about October 1st next. Loyalty to "Party" is responsible for much of the "dirty linen" that the Opposition is trying to hang on the Mmisterial clotheslines. The spectacle is not one to raise Canada in the opinion of the world as a Dominion of pure government.
The charges of graft are so numerons and persistent, and so boildly
made, that it is difficult to behave that they contain nothing but an effort to injure the government. There should be, a special, impar-tial tribunal, searching, powerfuand swift in its scope, where the guilty, whether they be the accused or the accusers, could be adequate-ly punished. These long-drawn-out in which it is getting to be safe out in which it is getting to consider to accuse the trial judges of partizanship, and the longest purse wins, are of little or no use in purifying the political atmosphere. Refying the political atmosphere. Re-sponsible government necessarily involves partyism; but when the electors permit their fealty to their particular party to sway their hon-est judgment as to what is best for Canada, there are always heads of politicians ready to take advantage of this false and foolish loyal ty. And while they steal the Dominion's money they laugh at the fools who elected their party to to power for no other reason than that they happened to be born grits or tories. Isn't it about time grits or tories. Isn't it about time that the vaunted educational system of Canada developed the electors who have the loyalty and conrage to vote their own convictions rather than blindly vote for party, taking their arguments from the overpaid political newspapers.

We do not believe the formation of an Independent Pa ty would tend to remedy the evil, for the heelers have the knack of prevening the best intentions of any mass of voters. But the voter should keep independent so that no polling place could be counted on for a given boss-ridden majority in election after election as is the case at present. A good wholesome fear of the individual elector is the best weapon Canada has to keep the government and the politician the government and the postessions honest. When turn-coats become respected by their neighbors, and dyed-in-the wool "partyists" be-orme recognized at their true medicrity, we are on the right road to compel an honest government in the best interests of the Dominion, instead of being entirely in the in-terest of themselves at the expense of the people.
