EDITORIAL NOTES.

The eleventh annual report of the Commissioner of PublicHighways is is to hand. It is bristling with in-fermation which should be known by every one who believes Ontario needs better roads.

In the year 1905 the township of Wellesley spent \$4,998 in cash and 6,317 days work in statute labor on its 198 miles of public roads. That would amount to \$25,25 cents cash, and 32 days work per mile.


Taking the expenditures on roads in Wellesley township for ten years makes appalling figures. The cash expenditures for the ten years ending with 1905 amounts to no less than \$40,851 according to the official figures. The stature labor during that time was 63,170 days; if commutel at 75 cents per day it would give \$47,398, or a total sum of \$88,229 which Wellesley township \$88,229 which wellesley township has put on its roads between Jan 1, 1896 and Jan. 1, 1906. This im-mense sum would pay for making overy inch of roads in the township on the permanent plan.

The financial crisis which recently appeared to threaten the Sover-eign bank is now apparently passed and under its new management it is hoped that the bank will win the confidence of the public and attain a worthy position in the business community. The heavy draft upon its capital stock and the practical the capital stock and the practical wiping out of its reserve fund was a heavy blow to this young finan-oial institution, but now that the worst is known and the air cleared the Sovereign may soon again have a high place among Canadian bank-ing institution. ing institutions.

Canadian banking laws are of a Canadian banking laws are of a nature not only to strengthen a bank during a crisis but to protect to an extended extent the deposit-ors. The New York Journal of Commerce says:— 'Canadian bank-ers and financial writers have a right to congratulate themselves upon the superiority of their bank-ing system, which is more nearly perfect than any other in the world. perfect than any other in the world, and puts to shame the clumsy and disordered national system of the United States. It affords, in what is here sometimes derisively spoken of as 'assets currency,' a per-fectly safe and elastic form of note circulation, which expands and contracts with the demands of buscontracts with the demants of our-iness; and through the branch banks it furnishes the means not only of distributing and collecting the currency readily, but of plac-ing the capital and credit of the main institution where they can be main mastration where they can be used to the best advantage. The superiority of the system over ours is constantly exhibited, but if a time of strain and stress should come it will be demonstrated in a striking fashion that ought to teach us a lesson. Canada is justly us a lesson. Canada is justly proud and confident of her banks, and our loose-jointed and cumber-some system is a cause of continual dissatisfaction, and is likely to be one of humiliation when put to a
