Montreal, July 5.—The management of the G. T. R. announced today four important changes in the staff of that system. A circular is issued by Mr. Chas. M. Hays, Second Vice-President and General Manager, announcing the appointment of Mr. Wm. Wainwright as Fourth Vice-President the former office of General Assistant and Comptroller which Mr. Wainwright held being abolished. Another circular from the Second Vice-President announces the appointment of Mr. Joseph Hobson as consulting engineer, with office at Montreal; while a third issued by Mr. E. H. Fitzhugh, Third Vice-President, announces the appointment of Mr. Howard H. Kelly as Chief Engineer on the Grand Trunk Railway System, vice Mr. Joseph Hobson, who has been appointed consulting engineer. The announcement comes from the office of Mr. Howard G. Kelley, chief engineer, of the appointment of Mr. William Mc-Nab as principal assistant engineer. Mr. Hobson gained fame by the construction of the St. Clair Tunnel.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Crop prospects are looking very good in this section at present in spite of the backward spring season. Haying and harvesting will be a week or two later than last year.

Tavistock's football players are bringing much credit to that village by the excellent "combine" work which has landed them so near the top of the league this year. In a few years when these youngsters get to be the business men of that place they will give the same joint-effort ideas to their work, and Tavistock will then get the much-needed fire protection, incorporation and other improvements which its more energetic residents have long desired and have been kept from getting by the lack of "combine" on the part of its business men.

The Provincial government has set aside one million dollars as a bonus to encourage the people to build "long stretches" of "leading roads;" they have empowered county councils to select and seize control of these roads and assess the people to maintain these chosen highways; Provincial Road Commissioner Campbell's recent annual report strongly favors the "long stretches" and county council control plan as against allowing each municipal council to accept the government's bonus and to provide and maintain its own permanent roads and bridges. And after all this the automobile manufacturers are not satisfied, for at their annual convention a week or so ago resolutions were presented asking the government to increase the bonus from one-third the cost to one-half. But the automobile convention highly praised Mr. Campbell's "long stretches" efforts, although they appear, so far, to be comparatively futile. Does not all this indicate that an attempt is being made by somebody to divert this "million-dollar fund" to the automobile interests rather than to those of the farmer? It certainly looks like it to the township municipalities of the Province, and they are consequently very diffident about having anything to do with the government's bonus offer under the laws at present restricting its disbursement.

The farmer is not opposed to good roads; but he wants them to run from the farm to the nearest market. And he is not opposed to automobiles; he will be a buyer of them when the road laws governing their running become equitable. But he is opposed to being made to pay for making long stretches of our best roads better so that fool chauffeurs can drive him into the ditch or onto the mud roads of the back concessions.

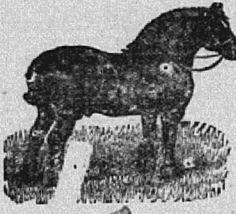

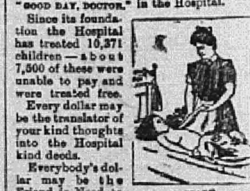
Will You Help It?

THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN

For it Cares for Every Sick Child in Ontario whose Parents Cannot Afford to Pay for Treatment.

The Hospital for Sick Children, College Street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it cures within its walls every year.

The Hospital is not a local institution—but Provincial. The sick child from any place in Ontario who can't afford to pay has the same privileges as the child living in Toronto and is treated free. The Hospital had last year, in its beds and cots 761 patients. 257 of these were from 196 places outside of Toronto. The cost is 98 cents per patient per day, and there were 129 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.
