EDITORIAL NOTES.

Haywood, the labor leader who has been on trial the last three or four weeks on a charge of instigating the murder of an ex Governor of Idaho, was declared not guilty by the jury and released last Saturday morning. The evidence that connected him with the murder was given by a self-confessed multi-murderer, and the jury refused to convict upon his evidence which was unsupported by any other witness.

The time has come when the Whitney government should see to it that that vacant office at Berlin was filled. Conservatives and Reformers alike, and the press on both sides, are clamoring to have it done. It is a well-known secret that the trouble is caused by a deadlock between the executives of the North and South ridings who are each trying to get their man the "fittest" part. But the office should not be left vacant for any reason whatever by a Party which has so persistently in past years accused their opponents in power of keeping these offices dangling open for corrupt purposes. There may naturally be rivalry for so good an office but it is up to Whitney to remove the stigma from his party by seeing that the appointment is made without further delay. If party services and ability are the basis upon which these offices are given then there is no doubt that Ferdinand Walter, the "Father of the Conservative party in Waterloo" deserves this appointment; if the two ridings each want their man in, W. H. Plum, of New Hamburg, lives on the boundary and has done valiant work in both ridings and so should be an acceptable candidate. If the two ridings cannot come to an immediate conclusion Whitney should step in and name the official over their heads. Some respect should be paid to the twenty thousand Reformers who put country before party at the last election and voted for "Whitney and pure government."

The Grand Trunk Railway Company has investigated the traffic possibilities of the Wellesley section and has sent engineers to ascertain the cost of building a spur line from Baden to Wellesley. The reports have been before the magnates for two or three weeks and there is naturally some anxiety in this section while waiting for their decision. In the meantime rumors of a C.P.R. line and a C.N.R. line through Wellesley are being persistently floated here from unofficial sources, possibly with a view of weakening a G.T.R. bonus vote should one be submitted. Whatever the fate of the present scheme this section will not remain much longer unexploited. There already is a strong feeling that private capital, supported by bonds and bonding the road-bed, could without much difficulty be raised to build and operate an independent line from Wellesley to Waterloo where it could connect with the C.P.R. and G.T.R.

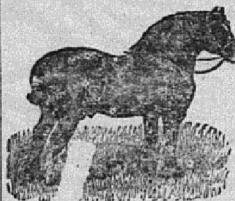

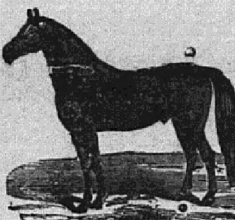

WILMOT COUNCIL.

The minutes of the 66th Session of Wilmot Tp. Council held at the Tp. Hall Baden on the 13th day of July 1907.

Members present, the Reeve presiding.

The minutes of the previous session were read and confirmed.

A petition signed by H. Kentz and 116 others asking to have By-law No 425 (Re-Assessment for Electric Purposes) repealed and that the balance of said Electric Light Fund now in the treasury be refunded pro rata, to the parties from whom it was collected, was received and in response thereto it was moved by S. 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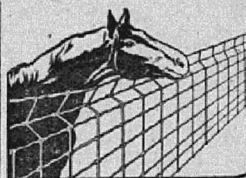
