With the large roller mill closed and the railroad outlet scheme quashed Wellesley must hustle to hold its own these days. Such a fire disaster as has fallen upon Neustadt and other unprotected villag-es recently would strike a blow at Wellesley's prosperity just now from which it would take years to recover. If, for the time being,our village is to suffer in a business sense, let it not be because of improvidence and a lack of public spirited energy.

Really the electors, who are con sidered qualified to elect M. P. P's to appoint these office holders should be qualified to elect these officials themselves. It would certainly be a move towards purer politics, which is the country's greatest need

Wellesley township is grappling with the question of building brid-ges this year in earnest. But it is a question if this permanent class of work should be paid for out of the cur-rent year's taxes.
