EDITORIAL NOTES.

The unusual weather early this year which resulted in a very late spring, together with the storms and general rough weather as the season advanced, led to the impression that this would be a bad year for agriculture. Now that the grain crops are off and threshing commenced farmers are waking up to the fact that the Wellesley section is a money-maker in any kind of weather. Wheat, oats and barley all show a full average yield, while the roots and other late crops are developing remarkably well in this dry spell through which we have of late been passing. The high prices for all kinds of farm products, too, are holding our remarkably, and the man who tills the land can afford a kindly smile for 1907.

For a village which has got some hard knocks of late Wellesley is holding out in gratifying style. Property values and rentals are steady, building operations are fairly lively while some other places with much greater advantages are not doing nearly as well. Wellesley's business is built upon a sound financial basis; it is the natural market for a large and wealthy farming district, and there is no doubt that when it gets railway connection it will jump into a high place in population, manufacture and importance in the country.

Mr. R. L. Burden M. P., opposition leader, is now making a tour of the Dominion in view of the coming elections. His platform, already published broadcast, contains many things of a praiseworthy nature, and is especially profuse in offering to supply political formaldehyde.

Stratford will wake up some morning soon and find itself a city of 20,000 population. The Hospital for Sick Children, College Street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it nurses within its walls every year.

Representative farmers, appointed by Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta Governments, will meet and arrange business on arrival at Winnipeg. From Toronto to Berlin on O.T.R. and all stations north to and including Can. Pac. Stations Toronto to Owen Sound. From Toronto and east, to and including Charlott Lake and Kingston, also north of Toronto and north of Cardwell on O.T.R. and north of Berlin Junction on Can. Pac. A certificate is furnished with each ticket, and this certificate when presented by farmer to the railway company will entitle him to a return ticket to his home at the rate of 50% of the full fare. Tickets good only on special Farm Laborers' trains and will be issued to women as well as to men, but will not be issued to half-bred children.

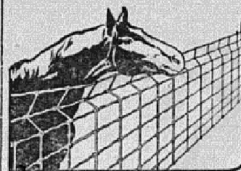
