EDITORIAL NOTES.

That we are on the eve of Dominion elections is getting more evident every week. The reconstruction of Laurier's Cabinet and Borden's tour equally point to it. Mr. Bourassa's statement that he expects to retire from Dominion politics and enter the Quebec parliament shows that while he is opposed to a part of Laurier's policy yet he is not prepared to extend that opposition into the general elections which he apparently sees approaching.

The provincial so called "party" newspapers present the funniest aspect of a political contest. They throw their whole energies into the fight, giving column after column of free advertising without hope of reward or thanks, and the surety of heaps of abuse from the other party, while at the same time a church or philanthropic society has to pay full price per line for announcements. When political organs cease their grinding the atmosphere will be cleared of at the least three-fourths of the corruption of which the suffering public is now compelled to read so much.

The Hospital for Sick Children, College Street, Toronto, appeals to the fathers and mothers of Ontario for funds to maintain the thousand sick children that it nurses within its walls every year.
