PRAIRIE BIRDS AND FLOW- ERS.

Miss Agnes Leonard, who went
with her parents to Moose Jaw a
couple of years ago, writes as fol-
lows to a schoolmate here regard-
ing the birds and flowers in her
neighborhood:

"We have different birds, more
so of the kind that build
their nest in the grass. There
are all kinds of sparrows, swal-
lows, graybirds, catbirds, cowbirds,
any number of meadow larks, crows
woodpeckers, real songbirds and all
kinds of tropical birds, but I only
saw one pair each of bobolink and
robin. The robin had no tree to
build on so she built in our old
wardrobe which stood outside. In
spring thousands of wild geese fly

past. They are very good to eat,
better than the tame geese because
so much wild celery grows on the
prairie and the wild geese eat this,
the celery giving the meat a rich
flavor. There are any amount of
wild ducks, prairie chickens, mud-
hens and divers. The geese are
here in spring for a few weeks only
and then go away north to lay eggs.

So many flowers can be seen, at
my sister's especially. Really the
prettiest wild flower I ever saw
was the wild bogonia. They grow
in big clusters about four inches
long. I will send you some seeds."

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Our neighbor, the Milverton Sun has just added a type-setting machine to its already fine plant. The Sun furnishes an example of what a newspaper can do in a small village which appreciates printer's ink. Almost every business man in the village advertises liberally in the paper and no job work is sent out of the village because it can be done 5 cents cheaper in the cities. As a consequence of this local enterprise the Sun is one of the largest village papers in the Province, its office is one of the best equipped and the Sun itself is an advertisement which is worth hundreds of dollars to that prosperous village every year.

Mr. Borden, the opposition leader, as reported by the press, said in one of his meetings on his present tour, "I speak to conservatives and honest Liberals." What did he mean?

"Our Dumb Animals", a paper devoted to the better treatment and protection of dumb animals, has a proposition to abolish war between Christian nations, which will do more than the Hague conference to bring about that much-to-be-desired condition of affairs. That journal suggests that a costly statue of Christ be erected on the boundary between Christian nations to commemorate perpetual peace between them, and before they can go to war after it is built both nations must join in the solemn ceremony of tearing the statue of Christ down. The pastors of every Christian church might be able to preach several profitable sermons from that text. Christianity and government should go hand in hand even although "church" and State are separated.

"Public ownership of public utilities" is getting to be a popular doctrine in Canada. For a long time the Toronto World stood alone in preaching this gospel; but now it is a part of the Dominion Conservative platform, and the Globe proclaims that it was always in favor of it. The railroad, telegraph, telephone, express and other corporations that have been sucking fatness out of the bleeding public for years are not yet quaking in their boots, but the people are awakening.

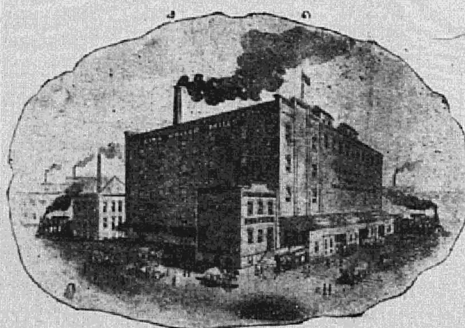

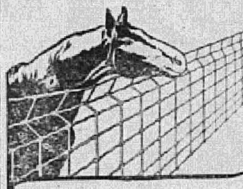
