Mr. Borden, the opposition leader as reported by the press, said in one of his meetings on his present tour "I speak to conservatives and hon-est Liberals". What did he mean:

"Our Dumb Animals", a paper nevoted to the better treatment and protection of dumb animals, has a propositi n to abolish war between Christian nations, which will do more than the Hague conference to I ring about that much to-be-de-ired condition of affairs.
