EDITORIAL NOTES.

It still holds true that if you are moderate in all things you will seldom have the bell-like Long ago wise men located the fact that a surfeit of anything is a poison and an enemy to serenity. Without serenity the joy of existence becomes permeated with an uneasy, out of poise sensation that is more or less annoying according to its severity. It is your nerves calling for help. Something you have done or left undone has backed them against the granite of discord, walloping them to shivering finale. If you do not hurry to their assistance disease will soon be drumming trade throughout your anatomy, whilst the shadow of death harkens the victim as the "green lady" does the chap whose soul is buried in the drip of the curse of France—absinthe.

Winnipeg is the gateway to the west, one of the richest cities in the world, the silvery lining to many a man's cloud, the mecca of wheat and plenty, and the cesspool and refuge of thugs, thieves, murderers and criminals of all classes. During the past few months several murders have been committed in this ideal capital of the west, and in each case the perpetrator of the deed belonged to a class who, by their inhuman and brutal actions, by their crude notions of law and justice, have shown themselves unfit to walk the streets of a civilized town and mingle with law-abiding citizens. 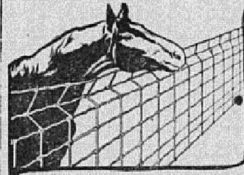
