Sudden Death of James McDonald.

We regret to record in this week's issue, the death of James McDonald, Parkhill, which occurred in a very sudden manner at his home on Monday morning last. Born on lot 17, con. 12, North Easthops, in January 1864, deceased was therefore 53 years of age. He was for many years a prominent and successful farmer, after which he moved to Wellesley and engaged in the implement business for a time. In September 1908 he opened a shoe store in the village and conducted same until April last, when, having bought out Mr. Redy's shoe store at Parkhill, he took up his residence at that place. During the short time he has been there he has worked up a good business, and won the esteem of all. Deceased was one of a family of nine, five sisters and three brothers, all living, and leaves a wife and three children, —Harvey, Maud and Alma.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, and in politics a loyal liberal. He was also a member of the A. O. U. W. and I. O. O. F. orders. Two years ago when in Toronto he was struck over the heart with a piece of flying brick from a dynamite explosion, and the result of this has at various times given him trouble.

The funeral will take place today (Thursday) from his brother John's residence at two o'clock, p.m., to Hampton cemetery.

Much regret will be felt by the people of Wellesley and district at the sudden death of deceased, who was so well known and highly esteemed in this vicinity. His bereaved relatives will have the sympathy of the entire community.

JOHN MAYER DEAD.

His oldest friends in Wellesley and this section will be pained to learn of the death of Mr. John L. Mayer, which occurred at his home in the Market hotel, Waterloo, on Thursday last in 63rd year. Mr. Mayer was born in New Hamburg, but at an early age was brought to Wellesley village by his parents and spent most of his school days here. In his youth he worked for some years as a carpenter, but later on he purchased the Allison hotel in this village, where he conducted a model and successful business for many years, finally selling out to the present proprietor, Mr. Krentzweber. Deceased had been afflicted for some years with heart trouble, which grew much worse of late so that he had to use the utmost care to prevent a sudden collapse. His sterling personality and integrity gained for him the respect and friendship of all, while his strong business qualities helped in a large measure the growth and prosperity of the village.
