EDITORIAL NOTES

The independent newspaper that shuns politics, is invariably "called down" by both parties, and strictly speaking has all the disadvantages of being on the dividing fence. If it were not for the sake of keeping as much peace as possible in the community, many silent papers would become party papers, as their lot is worse 'tun the fence' on either side. But for the danger of stirring up petty strife many editors would publish their opinions which they believe to be right, and which are right according to moral and political laws.

The moulders of public opinion should be given a chance to mould public opinion in an independent way and not to be hampered or fought by party prejudice. Every party is open to criticism, and surely we have an intelligent enough people to criticise a newspaper criticism to their own good and welfare.

But it is at this point that prejudice steps in and makes enemies. To run an independent newspaper nowadays, the publisher would have to be independent in every respect, even financially; and it is for lack of financial independence that so many maintain a stoic silence.

The government of Manitoba is leading the provinces of Canada in the line of municipal ownership. In spite of strenuous opposition on the part of the Bell Telephone Co., aided by opponents of the government, who sought to make the issue a party one, the people of the province decided for public ownership of their telephones and against an exacting corporation who were charging them exorbitant rates for a public utility. And now news comes that the Bell people have thrown up the sponge and decided to sell out to the government. This will simplify matters for the latter, who will take over the entire system as going concern and spared the difficulties of contending with a competitive line. If the movement is successful in Manitoba, no doubt the other provinces will follow.

The feeling against the Japanese in British Columbia is not dead, but still smouldering and only waiting further instigation to burst out more fiercely than ever. In the meantime the Japs are laying in stores of weapons and ammunition, and some sunny morning there will be Gehenna typified in Cosmopolitan Vancouver.

Another wreck took place a few days ago on the C. P. R. main line, in which one lady was killed and many other passengers injured. Our railways appear to be running a neck and neck race with lines across the border for premier honors in the accident line.

Now that the Toronto election is over and Beato's Nestor defeated, the public will await with interest the unsuccessful candidate's attitude towards the editor of the Toronto Globe.

INSPIRING ADDRESS OF EARL GREY TO WORKINGMEN OF CANADA

AN ACT THAT WILL TOUCH AND REJOICE THE HEARTS OF KING EDWARD AND QUEEN ALEXANDRA

On its way out to the official opening of the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives and King Edward Sanatorium on August 28th, 1907, the Governor-General's car was stopped in its progress outside the Canada Cycle & Motor Co. by the employees of those works. The sum of one hundred dollars was handed the Governor-General, a donation to the Toronto Free Hospital for Consumptives. His Excellency in acknowledging the ovation spoke as follows:

"I know that your action in subscribing out of your hard-earned earnings, so large a sum as one hundred dollars, will touch and rejoice the hearts of Their Majesties, for there is nothing that lies nearer the hearts of King Edward and Queen Alexandra than the health and well-being of His Majesty's Canadian subjects, and there is no form of work in which Their Majesties are more interested than Hospital work. Therefore I say every man among you who has saved a quarter from out of his earnings, in order to help those who are endeavouring, by means of Hospital, Sanatoria, etc., to conquer consumption, and to banish it from the land, is following the example of our King, and is making a truly Royal gift."

"In the name of the King I thank you for your public-spirited generosity. I hope that your example will make its influence felt throughout the length and breadth of Canada."

Referring to this event at the opening exercises of the Sanatorium, His Excellency said:

"Ladies and gentlemen, when the workingmen of Canada are setting an example of this character, I hope that you will not be slow to follow, and I trust that the example of the Canada Cycle & Motor Company may be followed, as I am sure it will, in every factory and manufacturing industry throughout this land."

Sir Mortimer Clark, Lieutenant-Governor, in his speech on the same occasion said:

"You see what others have done. I trust, ladies and gentlemen, that what they have accomplished will be an incentive to you to follow their example."

This appeal is on behalf of the Muskoka Free Hospital for Consumptives, an institution that accepts patients from all parts of Canada and that has never refused a patient because of his or her inability to pay.
