Road between cons. 8 and 9, west section from Linwood sideroad westerly to sideroad to the centre of lot 5.

Road on section line from road

between cons. 1 and 3, west section, southerly to road leading into Wellesley village; thence easterly along the same to the first sideroad in the east section; thence southerly along the same to the townline; thence westerly along the same to the centre of lot 3, con. 1, west section.

The townline from Wallenstein westerly one mile and one-eighth.


