CHANGES IN THE LAW.

Many changes have been made in the new Vital Statistics Act, relating to the matter of the registration of births, deaths and marriages, and incidentally involves a big increase in this department of the clerk's work.

Formerly the undertaker could procure a burial permit on presenting to the clerk a duly executed statement regarding the deceased signed by the attendant physician.

According to the new act a second elaborate form must be filled out by a relative or intimate acquaintance of the deceased, before the clerk may issue this permit.

The new birth-forms also go into more searching detail regarding the parentage of the child than formerly. The date and place of birth must be accurately given, as well as the names of the child's grandparents and a detailed statement of whether the mother is married, single, widowed, or divorced.

Under the new act it will be obligatory on the part of the registrar, if he knows of any births, deaths or marriages which have not been duly registered within thirty days of their occurrence, to report them to the Inspector of Vital Statistics, who will write a preliminary note to the delinquents. If such a notice is ignored, summonses will be in order.

The Toronto Exhibition is in full swing, with bright prospects of being the "biggest ever." It means over-crowded trains and belated mail for the traveler and business man for a couple of weeks, but little things like that don't count when Ontario goes to Toronto to shake hands.

Monday, October 19th next, has been set apart as Thanksgiving Day for the Dominion of Canada. The setting of a Monday instead of some day in the middle of the week for this holiday is a new departure and it is expected that the change will cause a more general observance on account of the more advantageous week-end and railway rates obtainable for commercial travelers and those away from home.

Hastings.

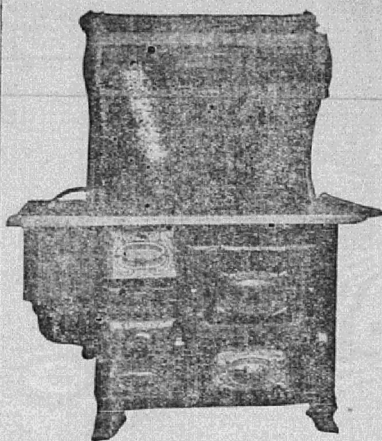
Boston, Sept. 3rd.—A most horri-
