

According to the new act a elaborate form must be filled out by a relative or intimate acquaintinco of the deceased, before the clerk may issue this primit.

The new birth-forms also go into more searching detail regarding the parentage of the child than formerly. The date and place of birth must be accurately given, as well as the names of the child's grandparents and adulated statement of whether the mother is married, single, wid-owed, or divorced.

Under the new act it will be oblistory on the part of the registrar, if he knows of any births, deaths or marriages which have not been duly registered within thirty days of their occurrence, to report them to the Inspector of Vital Statistics, who will write a peremptory note to the delinquents. If such a notice is ignored, summonses will be in


